

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INTRODUCTION

Backyard Buddies is a beautifully illustrated somewhat factual introduction to the hoppy, crawly, wriggly, buzzy, fluttery critters that call your backyard home. It is the perfect companion to Backyard Birdies.

Each double-page spread contains a description of the buddy, an indication of its size, a 'Top Tip', an explanation on whether it is okay to touch the creature, other facts, such as its favourite plant (if it has one), its colours, and what time of day it might appear.

The text also offers amusing jokes about each of these eleven backyard buddies. This is a work of creative non-fiction which entertains as much as it informs. It will encourage students to enjoy observing creatures in their backyards or local environs and identify the types of buddies which can be found in their own backyards. It also includes a glossary of terms. Andy Geppert's sense of humour makes even the latter an hilarious reading experience in this highly engaging text.

THEMES & CURRICULUM TOPICS

Several themes are covered in this book which might be related to the Australian Curriculum, including:

HUMANITIES AND SOCIAL SCIENCES (HASS)

Activity: Investigate how one of the backyard buddies in this book adapts to their environment.

Discussion Point: Invite students to observe the ecology of the environment in their own backyards. Apart from the backyard buddies included in this book, what other forms of wildlife do they observe in their own backyard? Make a list and then collect facts about each creature.

Discussion Point: How do human beings interact with creatures in their home environment? Very often, because of landscaping and garden design, home-owners view backyard creatures as pests. How can we live harmoniously in our own backyards? Invite students to discuss the ways in which creatures might enhance a backyard rather than being considered a threat or a nuisance.

Discussion Point: Some backyard buddies are considered dangerous, and are killed by human beings, for example, spiders. Research and discuss dangerous creatures that are found in backyards and how we should approach them.

Discussion Point: Camouflage protects several creatures depicted in this book, for example, moths. Observe other forms of camouflage depicted in the book and found in your own backyard.

BACKYARD BUDDIES

Discussion Point: Choose one of the backyard buddies in this book, and research it further. Then share your findings with members of your class.

Discussion Point: Create a 'fact file' on each of the backyard buddies in this book. Every time you discover an interesting fact, add it to the file.

Discussion Point: Create an alphabet of backyard buddies including those in this book and add a fact to each entry. [See **Worksheet 2**. below.]

Discussion Point: What are the collective nouns for any of the creatures in this book?-

Activity: Investigate the lifecycle of one of the backyard buddies in this book.

Activity: Read stories about human beings interacting with creatures in their backyards.

Activity: Read some picture books which explore our relationship with other backyard buddies or creatures. See **Bibliography**.]

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERACY

The text of this book might be studied in relation to the following aspects:

Activity: This is an expository text, so it is a type of non-fiction text which investigates and explains a particular subject. Discuss the elements of expository writing with your students then invite them to choose a buddy and write an expository text about it.

Discussion Point: Humour is one of the elements of this text which is important to how it conveys information, for example, 'Ladybugs belong to an unusual group of creatures that actually like coriander.' or 'TOP TIP: When thinking up a name for your new spotty little friend, remember that not all ladybugs are ladies! So, feel free to call it Keith.' (p 2) Another example of humour, is the inclusion of a creature which is not actually an insect or any other form of living creature — a pet rock. What other examples of humour did you discover in *Backyard Buddies*?

Discussion Point: The collective noun for ladybugs (ladybirds) is 'a loveliness of ladybugs'. What other collective nouns for each of these backyard buddies can you discover?

Discussion Point: On p 24 some words are explained. Discuss this list with your students.

Activity: Test your students' **comprehension** by asking them questions about the written and visual text. [See also **Author/Illustrator's Notes** below.]

VISUAL LITERACY

The visual text of a book combines with the written text to tell the story using the various parts of the book's design and illustrations, as explored below:

Activity: The **cover** of a book is an important part of its message. Identify the backyard buddies which feature on this cover and then design your own cover featuring 'buddies' who live in your backyard (or verandah or windowsill)!

Activity: The **endpapers** feature silhouettes of backyard buddies with a contents page to show which page that particular creature appears in the book. Design endpapers featuring other buddies not included in this list. [See **Worksheet 4** below.]

Discussion Point: The **title page** contains a humorous image of a bee dressed in clothes sitting on a chair. Why did the author depict the bee in this way? What does it suggest about the text to follow?

Discussion Point: The **format** of the book is square. What effect does format have on the meaning made in a book?

Discussion Point: How does the **layout of the storyboard** and the **format and design** of the book influence your reading of it?

Discussion Point: Creating characters entails studying **facial expressions and 'body language'**. What do these images suggest about the buddies in this book?

Activity: The **medium or style** employed is sketching and digital illustration. 'My technique is one that blends hand sketching with a soft watercolour feel.'

Discussion Point: The **colours** used in this book are largely pastel shades. Invite students to choose a buddy to draw and then choose a colour palette to paint it, based on research into what the buddy actually looks like.

Activity: Invite students to draw, paint, or collage an image of a buddy they wrote about above. Create a classroom mural using all the images. [See also **Worksheet 1** below.]

Activity: Create a graphic novel/comic version of a scene in this book.

CREATIVE ARTS

There are many creative activities suggested by this text:

- 1. Create a **classroom display** of the images that students have drawn of backyard buddies.

- 3. Create a mask of a bee. [See Worksheet 5.]

- 4. Create a poster to advertise this book.
- 5. Create a Book Trailer to promote this book. [See Bibliography.]

CONCLUSION

Backyard Buddies is a great companion to Backyard Birdies and should provide both information and entertainment for young nature observers. Andy Geppert's approach is to combine sound research with humour and insight in a heady concoction which will engage both students and their teachers in a vibrant process of discovery.



9. Take ten butterflies from those above and how many would be left?




10. Add sixteen frogs to those above and how many would you have?

Enlarge the mask below on A3 craft paper and cut it out, including the eyes. Decorate it then add elastic to the sides so you can wear it.


