The GREAT AUSSIE EASTER EGG-and-SPOON RACE

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INTRODUCTION

This is a heartwarming Easter picture book featuring Australian bush baby animals, which will appeal to fans of Little Bilby's Aussie Easter Egg Hunt.

Slow, sleepy Echidna is always trailing behind the other bush babies. And now it's time for their great Easter egg-and-spoon race. Can Echidna keep up with her friends, the other bush babies, and enjoy all the fun on this special day?

EASTER

<u>Discussion Point:</u> Easter is a religious celebration. Research its origin and the beliefs associated with Faster

<u>Discussion Point:</u> Easter has also come to be associated with secular celebrations and rituals. These include the Easter Bunny, Easter eggs, Easter baskets and Easter bonnets. What other rituals do we associate with Easter?

Activity: Make some Easter crafts. [See **Creative Arts** below.]

<u>Activity</u>: Read other picture books about Easter. [See **Bibliography** below.]

AUSTRALIAN ANIMALS

<u>Discussion Point:</u> The echidna is the focus of this story, but other Aussie animals appear in it as well: wombat, bandicoot, kangaroo and kookaburra. (The Easter Bilby is also mentioned.) What other Australian animals can you think of? Write a list of Australian animals in alphabetical order. Then write a fact about them. [See **Worksheet 2**.]

<u>Discussion Point:</u> Kookaburra calls echidna a little puggle as a baby echidna is known as a puggle. What other baby animal names do your students know? [See **Worksheet 3**.]

Activity: Make some Australian animal crafts. [See Creative Arts below.]

Activity: Read other picture books about Australian animals. [See Bibliography below.]

GAMES

Activity: The egg-and-spoon race is a game which has been played at least since the late nineteenth century. It is often included in school events. Research the history of this game

<u>Discussion Point</u>: What other games are popular at sports days, fetes and festivals? (For example, sack race or tug of war.) Visit websites to research this topic further. [See **Creative Arts** below.] [See **Bibliography**.]

COMPETITION AND COOPERATION

Discussion Point: The idea of competing against someone else is a common narrative convention in picture books and classic tales such as The Hare and the Tortoise. The latter is often described as a moral fable. How does this description relate to this picture book?

Discussion Point: Echidna is helped by her friends to win the race. Often competition can lead to unkind behaviour, so the message here is that in cooperating and helping each other, everyone is a winner, not just echidna. Invite students to discuss their feelings about this message and how it applies to their lives.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE AND LITERACY

<u>Activity</u>: The **structure** of events used here is typical of cumulative tales which often detail a repeated activity, for example, when searching for materials to make dye we are told that the animals each do something different:

The bush is full of bright colours – if you know where to look.

Wombat digs up some sticky yellow clay.

Bandicoot picks handfuls of juicy red berries.

Kangaroo fills her pouch with beautiful bush flowers. But Echidna comes back empty-handed.

This sets a pattern for echidna being the last in the pack, which of course leads to him becoming the winner! This reversal lies at the heart of the story's structure. Invite students to write a story about a hapless creature, like echidna, reversing his bad luck, based on this cumulative structure.

<u>Activity</u>: Test your students' **comprehension** by asking them questions about the written and visual text.

VISUAL LITERACY

The visual text of a book combines with the written text to tell the story using the various parts of the book's design and illustrations, as explored below:

<u>Activity</u>: The **cover** of the book features a wreath made of Australian wildflowers with echidna, kangaroo, wombat and bandicoot each holding a spoon and egg. Create your own cover for this book.

<u>Activity</u>: The **endpapers** are coloured mauve and do not include any images. Design some endpapers for this book using decorated eggs in a repeated pattern.

<u>Discussion Point:</u> The **title page** features a few objects found on a beach, under the lettering of the title. Invite students to design an alternative title page.

<u>Activity</u>: The **medium** or **style** employed is digital art. The **colours** used in this book are bright primary hues. Encourage students to discuss the colours used in the cover they design for the book.

<u>Discussion Point</u>: Observe the endearing **facial expressions** and **body language** of the animals. They give the reader some idea of each animal's character. How do these attributes advance the story? Invite students to suggest what sort of character they each have.

<u>Activity</u>: Invite students to draw, paint or collage another scene to accompany the story you wrote above about reversing a narrative situation. Create a classroom mural using all the images. [See also **Worksheet 1** below.]

CREATIVE ARTS

There are many creative activities suggested by this text:

1. EASTER CRAFTS

<u>Activity</u>: The animals paint their eggs by using dyes taken from nature. Invite students to choose something from nature, for example, red dirt, green leaves, yellow berries, and experiment with making their own dyes. They could then use the dyes to paint their own eggs.

<u>Activity</u>: Visit websites for inspiration and collect materials appropriate to your design to make the **Perfect Easter Bonnet**, for example see:

<u>Activity</u>: Invite students to suggest ideas for an **Easter Basket**. Visit websites such as the following for ideas:

<u>Activity</u>: Many people decorate their houses at Easter, as they do at Christmas. Some have an Easter tree, put Easter wreaths on their door, or create Easter table centrepieces. Create

such **Easter decorations** with your students. [See websites listed in the **Bibliography** for ideas.]

2. ANIMAL CRAFTS

<u>Activity</u>: Create a **Bilby Mask**. [See Template at: 'Bilby mask', *For Teachers For Students* https://www.forteachersforstudents.com.au/site/wp-content/uploads/pdfs/tmpl-bilby-mask.pdf>.

3. GAMES

Activity: Engage your students to play games such as an egg-and-spoon race or a sack race

4. POSTER

<u>Activity</u>: Create a **poster** to advertise this book.

5. BOOK TRAILER

<u>Activity</u>: Create a **Book Trailer** to promote this book. [See **Bibliography**.]

LEARNING TECHNOLOGIES

Activity: Research the topics above online.

Activity: Research the author and illustrator online.

MATHEMATICS

<u>Activity</u>: Have fun counting things on each page in this visual text, for example, eggs, shells, berries, flowers etc. [See also **Worksheet 4** below.]

FURTHER TOPICS FOR DISCUSSION AND RESEARCH

- Sophie Sayle is a debut author. How would you describe her style of writing?
- Research the work of Daron Parton. Compare this to his other books.
- Students might research this book in comparison to reading other picture books such as those listed in the **Bibliography**.
- Investigate any other topic not covered in these notes which you consider is suggested by this text.

CONCLUSION

This is an entertaining title for young children. The plot involves Easter, Australian animals and outdoor games – a formula for lots of fun.


Sophie Sayle grew up in Sydney and now lives in Melbourne. She enjoys long bushwalks and large Easter eggs.


