Activity 1a: Pre-reading discussion questions

Prediction Task

Discussion questions

- 1. Why do you think the woman makes a paper boat and a paper bird for Mina?
- 2. Do you know the name for the Japanese art of folding paper?
- 3. What do you think will happen with Mina in the book? How are the paper boat and paper bird significant in the story?







Page 1

Discussion questions








Activity 3a: Making an origami paper boat

Origami is the Japanese art of paper folding. Can you follow the instructions below to make your own origami boat?


Using a rectangular A4/A5 piece of paper, carefully follow each diagram below to create your own origami boat.








- 1. Start with an A4 or A5 piece of paper. Fold it in half to create a crease and then open it up again.
- 2. Fold it in half the opposite way.
- 3. Bring the corners to the centre crease to create a point.



4. Fold the top layer upwards and do the same on the other side.




5. Pull the sides out and flatten, so it looks like the next image.












6. Fold the front layer up to the top. Turn over and do the same on the other side, creating a triangle.




7. Pull the sides apart and flatten.



8. Gently, pull apart the top parts to make a boat shape.





9. Flatten to crease all the folds really well. Then open out again to have your finished boat!
